ECE 4's Classroom Teachers: Ms. Atherton, Ms.Helen, and Ms. Lisa

Classroom Curriculum

- Literacy (Reading and Writing): Most of the children are able to identify their names as well as the names of their friends. We continue to work on our first and last names during our morning sign in.
- Math: We are expanding our knowledge of patterns. They are catching on to A-B patterns and have started working with extending the complexity of patterns, such as A-A-B (red-red-blue-red-red-blue), A-B-C (yellow-green-red-yellow-green-red), and A-B-B (pretzel-marshmallow-marshmallow). The children have learned about graphs and graphing.
- **PYP/Social Studies/Science:** We will begin our second unit of inquiry on November 26th, when we return from Thanksgiving Break. This unit is titled, "How We Organize Ourselves," and is an investigation into various important jobs in our community. We have many exciting learning opportunities during this unit, including several in-school field trips and guests!
- How to Support At Home: Take your child with you when running errands and talk about the various jobs you see people doing. Ask open-ended questions, such as, "What do you think the _____ (baker) does? What kinds of tools/utensils do you think s/he works with?" Please remember to ask questions that **do not** require a "yes" or "no" answer. Open-ended questions promote Critical Thinking Skills as well as opportunities for Oral Language Development. Help get your kiddos talking!
 - Talk with your child about your job and the type of work you do. Also, discuss other family members' jobs and what their roles and responsibilities are.
 - Here is a great math activity at home using Cheerios, pretzel sticks and minimarshmallows (or other edibles). Have your child create a variety of patterns (A-B (red-blue-red-blue), A-A-B (yellow-yellow-green-yellow-yellow-green), or an A-B-C (blue-yellow-red-blue-yellow-red, etc.) and let them eat their patterns when they are finished creating! Also encourage your child to count the pieces in his/her patterns. Look around your environment and see what patterns you see with your child. Stripes on clothes, colors all around, etc.
 - Please read to your child every night at least 20 minutes. Books that have only 1 line of text are best. Take a picture walk through the book and after reading, ask your son/daughter some questions, such as, "Who was in the story?", "Where did the story take place?", "What was the problem in the story?", etc.
