## 5 All About Seahorses

Seahorses are among the most recognizable creatures in the ocean because of their interesting shape. Even though their shape resembles a horse, they are actually a fish. There are over 30 species of seahorses, with the smallest measuring around  $\frac{1}{2}$  an inch and the largest measuring a bit more than a foot.

Seahorses communicate with each other using clicking sounds. Seahorses feed on plankton and small crustaceans.

The lifespan on a seahorse is pretty short; they usually live between 1-5 years. A well known fact about seahorses is that the male is the one who carries the babies. The dad has a pouch on the front of his body and can hold up to 2,000 eggs at a time.

Seahorses are the slowest swimmers in the ocean and can only swim about 5 feet per hour. They hold the Guinness World Book record for slowest swimming ocean animal. It's a good thing they can grab onto things with their tail, otherwise the current would sweep them away constantly.

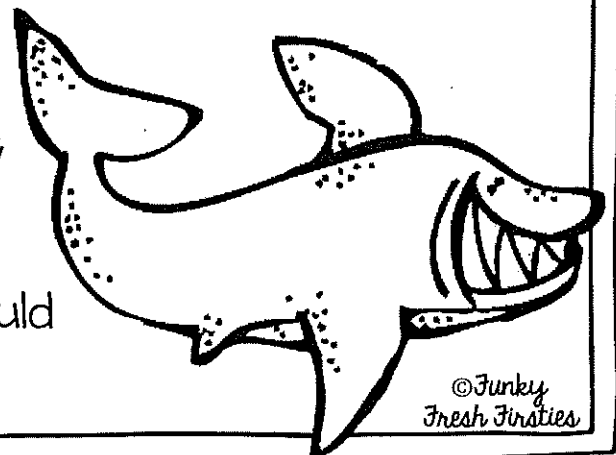


## ⑧ All About Great White Sharks

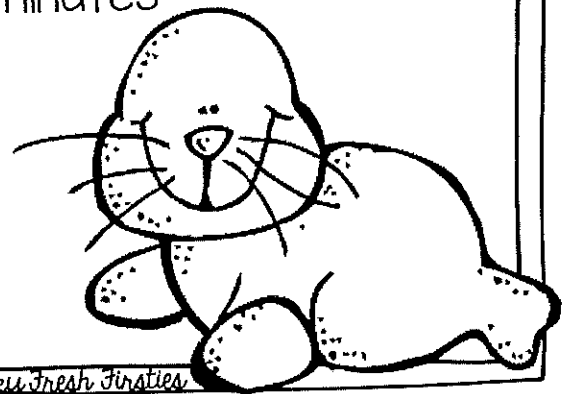
